Session 4 identity Bible Study

The first three sessions laid out for us the struggle some of us have with our identities in this sinful world. We have seen the struggle manifest in many ways but specifically in the life issues of transgenderism, premarital sex, and same-sex attraction. Since June is considered PRIDE celebration month by our culture, we have been focusing on these issues. In the fourth and last session of this study, we will look more deeply into the Christian identity and how to reclaim chastity in our lives as we confess Christ to our neighbors. We will discuss what it means to have a clear conscience. We will also spend some time discussing the difference between tolerance and speaking the truth in love.

Summary: In this study we have tackled the issue of our identities in relation to our culture and to our Lutheran Christian worldview. We have studied it by examining the relationship we have with our Creator, the Triune God. We have been created by the Father, redeemed by the Son, Jesus Christ, and called and sanctified by the Holy Spirit. We have been given the gift of life through these means. The devil, the world, and our own sinful flesh have worked hard to bring this all to ruin. In this month of June when so many strangely celebrate their mistaken, self-

created identities in the name of PRIDE, we need to be even more focused on the fact that we are called to proclaim the life-affirming message of Scripture. We need to understand the struggle many are facing and help them to overcome their conflict by living life the way God intends us to live and sharing that truth with them. Some of our dearest friends and family members may have been affected by this movement, and even we ourselves may have been affected by it. My sincere prayer is that this study will help those who need to hear this truth and that God's Word will change hearts and bring them out of the darkness of death and into the bright light of His life.

Closing Prayer: Dear Lord and Savior, we give thanks to You for fighting the good fight inside of us against all that is in opposition to God our Father. May Your Spirit help us to daily crucify our flesh, even when it hurts. Let us know the joy and freedom that is in our hearts when Your Spirit blows in us. When we feel weak and doubt, when we struggle with our desires and lust to seek intimacy outside of Your order and design, fill us with Your presence so we always know to whom we belong and comfort us with the knowledge that You are with us always.
